## 1) INFORMATION ON UPCOMING EVENTS:

Sunday, Aug 29: Dog Day at the Alaska State Fair in Palmer
We'll have our presentation at 6-6:45pm in the corral. All dog demos will be at the Pebble Corral, starting as early as 10:30am this year, with The Birdman of Las Vegas having several shows in between.

10am-5pm: Vendor booths - open to visit. Also: gear swap, face painting, photographer on site. Would you like to have a booth at our event? No fee, we'd just like to know ahead of time to plan you in. The booths will be outside on grass. You could bring a pop-up tent, a table and a chair to set up your stuff. If you need any of those, please let us know. We can help with some of it!

10am: Canine Good Citizen® test: 10am: same-day sign-up; paperwork for everybody; then general briefing of all participants; testing starts after the briefing in the order of sign-up (payment received). Fee is $\$ 10$ (pre-registration) or $\$ 15$ (day of test) per tested dog. Would you like to see what a Canine Good Citizen® test is about? Then come and volunteer! No pre-requisite required, we'll teach you on the job. Let us know if you can help, so that we can schedule you in. Then show up at 9:30am, $1 / 2 \mathrm{hr}$ before the sign-up starts. We also need a CGC-dog for the meet-and-greet with a strange dog. If your dog has passed the CGC-test and is mellow and neutral about strange dogs, you could be the one!

11am: Nose Work demonstration - check out this new fast-growing sport for our fourlegged friends! Every dog with a nose can do it! This sport builds confidence in shy dogs, mellows out dog-reactive dogs, and is fun for any dog of any size and shape!

12-5pm: Meet the Breed - have a purebred dog/ want a dog? Bring your dog and we'll present your breed to the crowd, talking about their temperament as well. Not purebred, but well-behaved? Bring him/her on and let us guess what breeds yours combines! ©

12:15pm: silent auction - part 1 will close (smaller items). We'll part with some of our used agility equipment.

12:30pm: Sharing Alaska's Trails - keeping (or getting) dogs out of traps in AK. Free DVD presentation (Alaska Trapping Association).

## 3) HOW TO SIGN UP FOR THE CLASSES:

It's easy!!! On our webpage www.bettercompanion.com, use the menu bar on the left. You'll find a button "Classes", with the subtitle "Registration", which brings you directly to the one
registration form for ALL classes. After clicking "enroll" at the end, you'll get to the pricing and payment page, which explains all payment options, policies, and allows you to pay online, too. You can also check out the pricing page first, to learn about prices, payment and cancellation policies. Take advantage of our pre-registration fee by signing up a minimum of 14 days before the start of your class. Please read our cancellation policy on the pricing page - you almost can't lose!

Puppy 1 Preschool clients, please remember you can also purchase the Puppy School Packet, including P1 and P2 class. You only have to commit to the seven weeks of P1 class, and will receive a voucher for P2, valid for 1 full year! For P2 voucher holders, the voucher will be your payment. After you fill out the registration form for P2, you can email us the voucher number, mail the voucher to us or drop it off at the facility.

Reserve your spot! Please note our registration policy: Only the payment will hold your spot. Spots are reserved in the order we receive payment for them. Always sign up for the class you want to join, even if it could be full. Only the payment will keep you on the waiting list, in case somebody else drops out before the class starts. Your payment is never lost, even if the class is already full. Your payment will 1) save you a spot at the class, or 2) save you a spot on the waiting list, or 3 ) can be carried over to a later class, or 4) can be refunded if I couldn't get you in the class you chose, or 5) can cause me to open an overflow class © $\odot$. Just as a note: I sometimes get up to three dogs per class moved in from a waiting list before the class even starts. We now can take credit card payments over the phone and at the facility.

## 4) SOCIAL HOUR - OPEN PLAY TIMES:

Come with your dog for one hour of dog play and dog owner social time. Each dog must be supervised by an adult handler, one dog per handler only. Vaccinated dogs only (5way/DHPPi, dogs over 6 mo : Rabies, Bordetella). We also require having the dog dewormed or a fecal sample checked.

Please note the following dates when we'll be closed for Open Play Times:
Sep 3: No OPT
Sep 6: No OPT, no daycare (Labor Day)
BetCo will be closed Dec 18 - Jan 2 (no daycare, no OPT, no classes)
First-timers: bring your vaccination papers, we want to see them! Dogs over 6 months, please for the first time come on a Friday, when Claudia and Frank are managing the play times. After that, we'll discuss with you which hour will be best and if you can come Mondays as well.

Fee: $\$ 7$ at the door or punch card $\$ 35$ for 6 visits.
Our Open Play Times (indoors + outdoors) have become a safe playground for dogs of any size due to the newer size restrictions for each group. Only timid and absolutely non-reactive dogs can be slightly heavier than the group limit. The group from 7-8pm is limited to 8 dogs, and reservations can be made in advance. Just call us and we explain the details.

## Every Monday AND Friday:

5-6pm: toy and small dogs and puppies up to 25\#
$6-7 \mathrm{pm}$ : puppies and medium adult dogs 30-50\# (giant breed puppies can be heavier)
7-8pm: Large adults over 60\# (indoors: 8 dogs max; outdoors: 10 dogs max)
8-9pm: Large Dogs over 60\# (if needed)

## 5) GOOD LEADERSHIP DOESN'T MEAN BEING BOSSY

Dogs are pack animals. They look at us as their pack. They check us out to see where everybody is standing in ranking. And every pack has a leader, they know that. If we give them wrong signals, and inadvertently suggest to them that we are just regular pack members, but not leaders, they might decide to take on that open position.

We like to see our dogs as our companions. We feed them, we take them on walks, we care for them, we pet them, we groom them. This doesn't make us automatic leaders. This could backfire and make us their servants. Have you ever thought, what an alien might think of us, watching us from out of space? They see a dog and a human connected by a string (leash), the dog being in the lead. And if the dog drops something (the "number two"), we eagerly clean that up for them. Doesn't that make us look like servants?

Now we don't need to constantly walk in front of a dog to show him that we're in charge. And we only have to prove it to the dog, not the aliens, right? And we still need to feed, walk and groom them. What makes us the leader, is HOW we do so. Do we feed the dog because she's letting us know that it's time, that she's hungry? Then she's demanding it, and we follow. That makes her the leader. Or do we feed him because we decided to, and because the dog just 'pleased us' with good behavior, then we are the leaders.

That's why the NILIF-concept evolved as the best leadership program: NILIF stands for Nothing In Life Is Free. If the dog has to "say please" every time before he gets something, it's clear that we're "in charge". In charge of the resources, in charge of the dog's life or death. And I'm not only talking about food. I'm talking about all the little things dogs desire: giving them attention, in form of a look, a pet, or even play; giving them the toy they want so badly; opening a door for them (house, car, gates...); taking them for that walk (which includes hooking up the leash or allowing them to jump in the car); allowing them to proceed towards the field, the class room, that other dog, while they're on leash. We have the power to deny any of that, or allow.

If we use that power wisely, that alone will show our dog that we indeed are their master, without having to get loud with them, argue with them, or roll them on their back once a day. A good leader is calm, consistent, predictable, and honest - in the dog world as well as in the real world!
